college. This year we provided at least \$3,500 to 119 students for a total investment of \$446,500.

We serve six high schools and two community colleges: Antioch, Concord, Deer Valley, Mt. Diablo, Pittsburg, and Ygnacio Valley High Schools and both Diablo Valley and Los Medanos College. Students are chosen on the basis of both academic merit and financial

Remembering a Mentor

In Fall, 1986, **Frank Nelson** enrolled in a Diablo Valley College entry-level engineering course with **Hal Skamser**, former dean of a California university engineering school who at the time was living in Rossmoor but also volunteering to teach courses. After observing Nelson's work ethic at DVC Skamser went over to Nelson, put his hand on Nelson's shoulder, and said, "If you keep this up, you will go far in your career." Skamser was right. After he got a 1986 RSF Scholarship and graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1991, Nelson went far in his career as a Silicon Valley electrical engineer. So grateful was he for

Amber Peake got pregnant at 17, succumbed to alcoholism shortly thereafter, dropped out of high



school, and lost custody of her daughter as she struggled with addiction. Ultimately, she managed to kick the addiction, regain custody of her daughter and, after marrying, enrolled at Diablo Valley College. After graduating in 2022 she transfered to the University of California, Berkeley where she received a BA with Honors in Public Health in 2024 and a Master Degree of Public Health in 2025. "I have been pursuing my dream of medical school since the return to community college at DVC in 2019," she writes, "and am now officially a medical student at the University of Nevada, Reno

School of Medicine! I am forever grateful to the Rossmoor Scholarship Foundation for believing in me and being a part of my academic journey."

Meet Some of our Extraordinary 2025 Student Scholars. Here are their stories.

Overcoming Serious Health Issues

Diagnosed with an atrial septal defect and cleft lip and palate at birth, Pittsburg High School graduate Diana



Torres Arias always felt like a burden on her family. "My extensive medical conditions meant perpetual surgeries and follow-up cranial appointments that took up much of my family's time and exacerbated our financial issues." Because she

didn't understand medical jargon well enough to effectively translate for her family the gravity of her condition, she decided to become "an impassioned pediatric nurse practitioner" to help her community members negotiate challenges within the healthcare system. This fall she enrolled as a pre-nursing student at CSU Chico, with the goal of eventually entering the nursing program.

From Shackles to Scholarships

"For me," Benjamin Osborn wrote in his RSF application, "the most significant risk I ever took was choosing to believe that I could rise above my past." Osborne's early life

was marked with struggle that led to 24 years in prison. While incarcerated, he earned his GED and completed college courses with a 3.75 GPA. Once released he enrolled at Los Medanos College. "Education has been my bridge to



a new life. It has given me confidence, purpose, and a future I never thought possible." He hopes to become a certified drug counselor in California or Oregon.

A New Life After Afghanistan

In the Fall semester, 2025, Shamim Taqdesi will become her family's first-generation college student. Fourteen when the Taliban came to power in 2021, her family decided to leave



Afghanistan so she could continue her education. As they walked to the border, however, officials let Taqdesi and her ten-year-old brother pass, but held her parents and sister back. It was the last time she saw them. After two years in Pakistan she made it to the United States and enrolled in Ygnacio Valley High School in 2024. "The challenges I have faced fighting for an education have made me a stronger person and more confident of my goals," she writes. She will be attending Diablo Valley College.
